We Are Water Protectors by Carole Lindstrom

Rooted in the strength of Indigenous voices, this story follows an Ojibwe girl taking a stand to defend what matters most—water. It's a compelling introduction to environmental stewardship and community action.

Kindness Matters by Rosemary Moreno & Gale Vyncke

Our current installation features this heartwarming, locally created book. Designed with early readers in mind, this story, born during the pandemic, reminds us that even the smallest acts of kindness can have the biggest ripple effects.

Looking ahead, as we introduce books like *Forest: Bilingual Edition* by Brendan Kearney, a timely tale on deforestation and how young readers can help protect our planet.
